### **The Stationery Office Annual Catalogue**

The Government proposes to implement its residence test policy by means of an affirmative statutory instrument, which it laid in draft on Monday 31 March. This report looks at that statutory instrument, particularly in relation to its likely effect on children. It sets out in some detail the potential impact of the residence test on four particular categories of children: unaccompanied children, undocumented children, children with special educational needs or disabilities, and section 17 and 20 Children Act 1989 cases. The Committee regrets that the Government's proposal was not introduced by primary legislation to allow both Houses to scrutinise and amend its provisions, and it urges the Government to withdraw the instrument as currently drafted. If the Government does decide to proceed by affirmative instrument, the Committee expects the newly laid instrument to reflect its concerns. The Committee states that the Government's justification for its residence test proposal - to ensure that only individuals with a strong connection to the United Kingdom can claim civil legal aid at the UK taxpayers' expense - cannot be applied fairly to children. It concludes that, if the residence test applies to children, it cannot see any way to ensure that the views of children are heard in any judicial or administrative proceedings affecting the child, as required by Article 12 UNCRC, or to ensure that the child's best interests are a primary consideration

## **Practices in Children's Nursing E-Book**

This report calls on the Government to widen the scope of a proposed new adoption measure. The Government's proposed 'fostering for adoption' duty is

designed to encourage councils to place looked after children with foster carers who can then go on to adopt them, providing continuity and stability. The scope should be extended by creating a duty to consider a fostering for adoption placement for all children for whom adoption is the plan. The Committee does not find it necessary to remove any requirement to give consideration to ethnicity but recommends an alternative amendment to the legislation which accords ethnicity an equal place within the list of the child's needs and characteristics. Other recommendations from the Committee include: a wider application of the principles behind concurrent planning, which places children with prospective adopters while at the same time actively exploring rehabilitation to the birth family; earlier and more robust decision-making by social workers in establishing when rehabilitation with the birth family is no longer an option; a review of the Statutory Guidance on Adoption to ensure permanency planning is given serious consideration one month after a child enters care

## **Advanced Health and Social Care**

First published in 1999, this book provides a practical guide to those parts of the Children Act 1989 that relate to the provision of services by local authorities to children and families, dealing in particular with the powers and duties of local authorities in such circumstances, care and supervision proceedings and child protection issues. It combines a discussion of the legal framework of the Act and the regulations and guidance with information about good social work and legal practice, relevant research and recent case law. It is grounded on the author's practical experience of providing an advice and advocacy service for families and training for social workers, lawyers and other child care professionals.

## **The Children Act in Practice**

The Bill will give effect to the policies requiring primary legislation that were set out in the White Paper *Caring for our future: reforming care and support* (Cm 8378, July 2012, ISBN 9780101837828); will implement the changes put forward by the Commission on the Funding of Care and Support, chaired by Andrew Dilnot, (2011, ISBN 9780108510847); and will meet the recommendations of the Law Commission in its report on *Adult Social Care* (Law Com 326, HC 941, May 2011, ISBN 9780102971682) to consolidate and modernise existing care and support law. The Bill also gives effect to elements of the Government's initial response to the Mid Staffordshire NHS Foundation Trust Public Inquiry - *Patients First and Foremost: the initial Government response to the Report of The Mid Staffordshire NHS Foundation Trust Public Inquiry* (Cm 8576, ISBN 9780101857628) - that require primary legislation. Parts 1 and 3 of the Bill are built on the provisions set out in the draft *Care and Support Bill* (Cm.8386, ISBN 9780101838627) published in July 2012. The Government response to the public consultation on that draft Bill and to the report from the Joint Committee (HLP 143/HCP 822, session 2012-13, ISBN 9780108550515) that scrutinised it are included in this publication. The new measures in part 2 of the Care Bill that take forward the Government's response to the Francis Report on Mid-Staffordshire NHS Foundation Trust are also described.

## **Modern Tort Law**

This book examines, through a multi-disciplinary lens, the possibilities offered by relationships and family forms that challenge the nuclear family ideal, and some of the arguments that recommend or disqualify these as legitimate units in our societies. That children should be conceived naturally, born to and raised by their two young, heterosexual, married to each other, genetic parents; that this relationship between parents is also the ideal relationship between romantic or sexual partners; and that romance and sexual intimacy ought to be at the core of our closest personal relationships - all these elements converge towards the ideal of the nuclear family.
